CHAIR OF GOVERNORS UPDATE



I am writing this at the end of the autumn term, looking back on a busy time for students, staff and governors. Governors have continued to meet and to visit the school on many occasions.

In September we welcomed many newcomers to our excellent school. New students and staff came to us attracted by the school's inclusive and aspirational ethos, superb facilities and many exciting opportunities. The new Headteacher, Mr Domenic Volpe, and the new Deputy Headteacher, Mr Mark Barrett, are owed special thanks for the way they have assumed their new roles and worked

extremely well as a team at the top. It is unusual for both a head and a deputy to be new to a school at the same time, but they have made the transition as smooth as possible and are leading the school forward, building on the past while bringing in their own ideas.

In the first few weeks of term, governors and senior leaders looked at the GCSE and A level results from the summer's exams. Overall we were very pleased with the standards reached and we send belated congratulations to all involved. The school is improving its performance in relation to other secondary schools locally and nationally. The new Headteacher quickly analysed the results and formulated an improvement plan to continue to drive the school's performance upwards across the board. Every school has an improvement plan, designed to make sure resources and actions are in place to secure the best possible outcomes for students. Governors scrutinised the Kingsmeadow improvement plan and will monitor it throughout the school year.

As in all schools, the school budget continues to present challenges for resourcing all that the school would like to do. The Governors' Finance and Staffing Committee met twice during the term to look at the budget and allocation of school funding, and to agree pay increases for teaching staff where these were merited by individual performance by teachers. All performance targets for staff, teaching and non-teaching, are linked to the school improvement plan.

Governors continue to be very mindful of the need to look to the future, particularly to join in partnership with other schools at a time when our excellent local authority is finding it increasingly difficult to fund support for secondary schools. We have spent much time looking at options and as I write we are still waiting to hear from the government as to our chosen way forward. Once we have government approval, we will be consulting widely including with parents. From 2020 the government is introducing a National Funding Formula for schools, designed to iron out differences in school funding in different areas, and we are watching to see how this, alongside the government's commitment to maintaining levels of education funding, will affect Kingsmeadow. Governors will work hard with senior leaders to make sure that the school's special qualities and ethos are not diminished as we go forward.

On behalf of Kingsmeadow's Governing Board, I send very best wishes for 2018 to you all.

KINGSMEADOW CROWN AWARD

The **Kingsmeadow Crown Award** is an opportunity for us to recognise and celebrate all of the extra-curricular work that our students put into becoming an active part of the school and wider community. It comprises a range of tasks and activities which students can choose to complete over and above their usual lessons. These activities include such things as: taking part in a school show or sporting event; raising money for charity; completing acts of kindness in the local community; being an active member of a school group or club and many more.

All of our year 7 students can work their way through the **Crown Award**, from Bronze to Gold, by completing twelve different activities across three different areas - **Inspiring Minds; Opening Hearts; Transforming Lives.** It is important that they go online and log their achievements as they do them, so that they are not forgotten.

It is expected that it could take students a year or more to complete each stage, meaning that their input is substantial and sustained over time. This makes it a very prestigious award for Kingsmeadow students, as only a few students will progress through all three stages.

As of the beginning of December, we have twenty two year 7 students who have already made a significant start to completing their **Kingsmeadow Crown Award**. Very well done to those of you who have! Students taking these lessons have already seen a significant increase in their overall music attainment as well as developing a love for singing and playing their instrument.

Music World Voice

In October, Kingsmeadow School hosted a singing afternoon called **'World Voice'** which showcased the international singing that we and other schools in the cluster had been learning about.

Organised by Gateshead Music Service, The Sage and The British Council, a vocal leader from Kenya and another from Columbia came to work with Gateshead schools. Their purpose was to learn about how Music is taught here, and to impart their own knowledge of singing to us.

Mangahigh Competition

During the summer term of 2017, Year 7 and 8 students took part in an online competition called **'Boss of the North'** on an online site called Mangahigh. The aim of the competition was to complete as many Maths games and tasks as possible and score points by achieving a bronze, silver or gold award.

The students were able to compete against other students in Kingsmeadow as well as other students from schools across the north. We had 7 students achieve over 150 points each. For this they were each awarded a **Mangahigh Medal**.

National Cipher Challenge 2017

A small group of our more able Year 7 and 8 have been invited to take part in the National Cipher Challenge 2017 ran by Southampton University. Each week they are asked to decrypt two ciphers, one relatively easy and the second a lot more challenging, and submit their answers to score points as individuals and as a team entry.

The winners, both male and female individual and team entries, have the opportunity to win £1000 first prize and £800 runner up prize. There will be a prize giving ceremony in Spring.

So far the students have cracked Caesar shift ciphers, Transposition ciphers, Polybius ciphers and Vigenere ciphers.

Our students are stretched and challenged across the curriculum and we aim to embed a love of learning for all. Additionally, students identified as More Able can access weekly tutor time masterclasses and mentoring during which time academic theories/skills, cultural experiences and university/careers pathways are explored. Furthermore, **Culture Club** is offered to **KS3** students as an Active Tuesday activity to encourage them to increase their cultural capital. **KS4** and 5 students are also invited to take part in book club, the Northumbria University mentoring scheme and various extra curricular activities as they become available.

At the end of last term this included a residential visit to Cambridge University for **Year 10 students**, an HE discussion group, the Mathsplosion event for Year 9 and a Maths Feast! In addition, a selection of students were nominated by their primary schools to attend stretch and challenge events here at Kingsmeadow, culminating in a hugely enjoyable gifted and talented awards evening in June.



A Real Immersion Trip To A Real Prisoner Of War Camp

On 7th June, our 'REAL' students were given the opportunity to participate in a thought-provoking educational visit to **Eden Camp**, North Yorkshire, as an immersion event to form part of our third project of the year.

Eden Camp is holder of both the English and Yorkshire Tourist Boards Attraction of the Year Awards with its immersive displays that bring history to life. Housed in an original Prisoner of War Camp, the visit to this unique, award-winning museum transported our young people back in time to wartime Britain. The students experienced the sights and sounds and even the smells of the 'Home Front' and 'Front Line' in a series of expertly recreated scenes and even included a visit to the 1940s music hall to enjoy a puppet show and listen to the music from **Dame Vera Lynn, George Formby** and **Gracie Fields**. The experiences gained from the trip will be used to inspire and evoke further learning of WWII, evacuees and how communities came together to keep up morale in times of difficulty.

A 'Real' Exhibition Of Learning To Promote Community Cohesion

On 29th June our hall was transformed into a 1940s afternoon tea dance. Our 'Then and Now' event saw a mixture of senior citizens from our local area and school governors from both Kingsmeadow and Dunston Hill being entertained by our students, as they were taken on a whistle stop tour of WWII in a morale boosting and uplifting way. The 'REAL' staff worked tirelessly along with the school caretakers to transform the hall and set up an authentic afternoon tea with triangle sandwiches, fresh cream scones and a selection of cakes and pastries all served on, vintage china. They also had either tea or coffee which was kindly donated by Simon Musgrave from local business Ringtons Tea Merchants. Our students (dressed as WWII evacuees) then entertained our guests with their learning through the mediums of song and dance. The REAL staff were all dressed in 1940s fashion and our drama teacher Miss Pirie wowed with her WWII songbook medley, singing classics from Dame Vera Lynn and The Andrews Sisters. Our guests received gifts of foot warmers and a Ringtons' sample pack.

A Real Response To Poverty

As part of their current project with the driving question 'Does chocolate have any virtues?' our year 8 students and been learning about poverty around the world and how Christian charities respond to poverty. They have studied a charity called The Samaritan's Purse who organise 'Operation Christmas Child', this involves sending a wrapped shoebox full of new 'gifts' to a child in a country who, as a result of poverty, would not receive a gift this Christmas. Our REAL year 8 students responded to this by each class donating gifts or postage money and putting together a shoebox for the appeal. Miss Harris took all 6 boxes to a drop off point in the Metrocentre and our students all went home with a feeling of pride knowing they'd all been responsible for making a child smile this Christmas.

Our year 8 students began their first project of the year with an immersion event that included some blind chocolate tasting. Students needed to taste the different chocolate on offer then write a description and prediction of what it was. This immersion activity was just one of many which was aimed at hooking and engaging the students immediately ready for some REAL learning about poverty across the world, the industrial revolution, Christianity and charity and reading the novel 'Charlie and the Chocolate Factory'.


A Real Chocolate Factory Visit!


Bring It On



First Day Absence

Kingsmeadow School recognises that there is a strong link between achievement in school and good attendance; because of this we operate a first day response to absence.

If your child needs to be absent, could you please contact school on the first morning of the absence and explain the reason for absence. When reporting school absences please contact Kingsmeadow School on telephone number 0191 4606004 and press option 2 (to report an absence).

If your child is going to be absent for more than one day it is important that you keep daily contact with the school and when your child returns to school, please ensure that you sign their diary or send in a signed and dated note giving a reason for their absence.

If school do not hear from you then you will be contacted either by telephone or text message during the school day or by letter. If you have recently changed your contact details it is important that you inform school of any changes in cases of an emergency.
